

## RESOURCES FOR INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS

### *Assistance Available*

Georgetown University admits and enrolls students from many countries. Students who are neither citizens nor permanent residents of the United States are considered "international students". These students are usually in the United States on either an F-1 or J-1 visa, and will return to their home country upon completion of their studies.

International students are not eligible for the loan, work and grant programs offered by the United States. These programs are offered only to U.S. citizens or permanent residents.

Although financial assistance is limited for international students, resources are available to help meet educational expenses. This publication was developed to provide information about financing options available to international students enrolling at Georgetown University. International students should visit the Georgetown University Office of International Programs (OIP) web site at <http://www.georgetown.edu/ssce/iss/index.htm> to determine their rights and responsibilities while in the United States and as a student at Georgetown University.

### *Georgetown University Monthly Payment Plan*

Georgetown offers a monthly payment plan that allows students to pay all or a portion of their bill in monthly installments. For more information about this plan, contact the Office of Student Accounts at (202) 687-4092.

### *Loans for Educational Expenses*

**With a U.S. citizen as co-signer**, international students may be eligible to borrow through a private loan program. Information about loan programs available to international students may be obtained from the Office of Student Financial Services by calling (202) 687-4547, or by visiting their web site at <http://www.georgetown.edu/students/student-aid/>.

### *Employment Opportunities*

During their first year of study, international students may be eligible to work a limited number of hours on campus, provided they obtain permission from both their international student advisor and their Dean or academic advisor. After their first year of study, international students may be eligible for work both on and off campus for a limited number of hours and under limited circumstances, again with the appropriate permission.

### *Grants, Scholarships and Fellowships*

In general, Georgetown University grant and scholarship assistance for undergraduates is offered only to U.S. citizens or permanent residents, i.e., those students who qualify for U.S. government aid programs. Only five scholarships each year are offered to undergraduates who are selected from the pool of international students who apply for admission to Georgetown. Interested students do not have to apply for this scholarship; all foreign students who apply for undergraduate admission to Georgetown are automatically considered for these few awards. The Georgetown University Graduate School annually offers a limited number of awards based on academic qualifications to students in various departments of the Graduate School. Scholarships are tuition grants, while fellowships include a full tuition scholarship plus a stipend.

All awards are based on departmental recommendations. International students compete for these awards on an equal basis with U.S. citizens. For more information, graduate students should contact their department or graduate program.

Many foreign governments offer assistance to their citizens for study in the United States. International students are encouraged to contact their country's higher education administration for more information about funding opportunities from their government.

An organization that may be able to provide some information to international students is NAFSA: Association of International Educators, located in Washington, DC. Contact NAFSA at (202) 462-4811 and ask for the "Recording on Financial Aid" which provides information for international students interested in studying in the United States and United States students who are interested in studying abroad. NAFSA does not provide grants to international students, with the exception of a small grant program for students from East Central Europe, the Baltic States, or the former states of the Soviet Union.

The Rotary Foundation of Rotary International provides grants to university students and teachers to act as "goodwill ambassadors" around the world. The Rotary Foundation also sponsors international exchanges of business and professional people, and provides grants to improve the quality of life around the world. The AAUW Education Foundation provides graduate fellowships to women with the equivalent of a bachelors degree who are not citizens or permanent residents of the United States. International Fellowships support graduate students writing doctoral dissertations and postdoctoral scholars conducting research in the United States. Upon completion of studies, fellowship recipients must return to their home countries to pursue a professional career; preference will be given to applicants who can verify that they have a definite position awaiting them.
